

Convictions for traffic offences

According to preliminary estimates by the Ministry of Justice for 2013, there were 290,000 convictions and criminal compositions sanctioned for 361,500 road safety offences representing more than 43 % of all convictions and 37 % of all crimes and offences of the fifth class sanctioned by a conviction or a criminal composition.

Failure to respect the rules of the road

There have been 173,000 convictions (60 % of the total) handed down, corresponding to 187,000 offences sanctioned:

- 137,000 convictions for **driving under the influence** of alcohol: after a 39 % increase between 2000 and 2007, their number declined by 12 % since then. There were 21,600 convictions, or 15.8 %, repeat offences, as stable figure these last five years;
- 21,800 convictions for **driving under the influence of drugs**, or two times more than in 2009;
- 14,300 convictions for **serious exceeding the speed limit** (50 km/h or more), equivalent compared to last year, the highest rate for six year but half the rate for 2000.

Absence of the proper papers

There were 90,800 convictions (31 % of the total) handed down for 134,500 offences sanctioned and related to driving without a licence, driving when banned, driving with no insurance or number plates; it has fallen by 4.7 % since 2007. Often recorded due to other offences, half of these are linked to others within the same conviction. The offence for driving when banned was up 21 % since 2007.

Hindrance to controls by enforcement agencies

There were 15,300 convictions (5 % of the total) dispensed for 27,300 offences sanctioned for leaving the scene of an accident, refusing to comply, failing to provide a sample for alcohol analysis and using devices interfering with police instruments; it fell by 12.3 % compared to 2007. Custodial sentences were handed down in 47.6 % of cases, half of which were fixed in whole or in part.

Involontary physical injury

There were 8,700 convictions (3 % of the total) handed down for 9,800 convictions sanctioned :

- 7,800 convictions for involuntary injuries, 1,900 of which for drivers under the influence of alcohol. A custodial sentence was handed down twice as often if the driver was under the influence of alcohol (84 % of the penalties compared to 41 % if alcohol was not a factor);
- 900 convictions for involuntary homicide, 161 of which for drivers under the influence of alcohol.

Age

Excluding minors as they are little concerned with traffic offences, persons convicted of road safety offences are older than all other convicted persons: there are roughly half as many 18-19 year olds and almost one in three convicted persons is at least 40 years old compared to a little more than one in four for all adults convicted.

This distribution by age however differs according to the nature of the offence sanctioned:

- drivers convicted of **driving without a licence** are very young (37 % are between 18 and 24 years) and sometimes include minors (3.3 %). 18-24 years old drivers are also often convicted of **driving without insurance** (31 %). On the other hand, those convicted of **driving when banned** are older; their average age is 35.4 years (compared to 30 years for driving without a licence). It seems logical as this offence involves those having already been sentenced to a driving ban previously;
- those convicted of **driving under the influence of alcohol** are clearly older (38 years on average), only 17 % are under 25 years of age while people aged 40 years and over represent 44 % of those convicted. The drivers sanctioned for **driving under the influence of drugs** are very young, 47 % are under 25 years:
- for the purpose of involuntary physical injury to persons, distinction is made between the drivers under the influence of alcohol guilty of involuntary homicide of whom 48 % are under 30 years of age (compared to 45 % without alcohol), and the drivers having caused an injury without testing positive for alcohol whom 40 % are 40 years of age and 14 % are at least 60 years of age.

Gender

Women account for 10.6 % of all crimes. This rate is only 9.4 % for crimes linked to road safety but varies from one offence to the other. This low rate of female involvement is marked in situations of driving during a ban (6 %) or driving under the influence of drugs (4.5 %).

The share of women is higher with respect to involuntary physical injury not aggravated by alcohol (23 % in case of injuries, 18 % in case of manslaughter). The rate of female involvement has increased in recent years as regards driving under the influence of alcohol, which has progressed from 6 % in 2000 to 10 % in 2013.
